Dear Deer Park Families,

Fall is in the air. Students have settled into the routines of school. Teachers are beginning to prepare for Parent-Teacher conferences that are coming up in late October/early November. These conferences are an important time for you to meet the teacher and discuss the progress of your child. If you have not yet scheduled a time for this conference, your child's teacher will soon contact you to arrange a time. A reminder will go home at the end of the month with the date and time of your conference.

As parents, you entrust us with your child each day. I know you are eager to discover more about how they are doing. Some students come home eager to share what has occurred throughout the day. With most children, you need to ask a series of questions to glean any information. This conference is a chance for you to ask questions and receive more details about your child's day. You do not need to prepare in advance for this meeting, but to make the most of the time you will have with your child's teacher here are a few suggestions:

- Allow extra time. Plan to arrive in plenty of time to park and find the classroom. Allow a few extra minutes to get settled before you go into the meeting. Please also be aware that there will be conferences scheduled after your time. The teacher will need to stick to a strict time limit for your conference.
- Ask your child what questions he or she would like you to ask the teacher. Ask your child what he or she feels their strengths or weaknesses are and what they would like to focus on this next quarter.
- Write it down! Bring your child's list and add any questions you may have. If you have concerns about something in particular (e.g. amount of homework) add it to your list. If it is written then you may provide a copy to the teacher if you should run out of time in the conference. The teacher can then get back to you with the answers.
- Send questions in advance. If you have a couple of things in particular you would like to address at the conference, email or send a note a few days before the conference so the teacher can have the information ready for you and allow time for discussion during your meeting.
- Keep an open mind. The teacher may have observations about your child that will surprise you. If you keep an open mind then you are more likely to really hear what the teacher has to say and know how these observations impact your child at school.
- Work together. If your child is struggling in a particular area, ask how you can help support your child. If you need training or information to help, let the teacher know. We have many resources to help students and families.
- Report back to your child. Your child knows that this meeting was scheduled. He or she will want to know what the teacher had to say. Be sure to share the positives the teacher shared, but also be honest in talking about the things that will be focused on in the weeks ahead for improvement. Use this as an opportunity to set some simple goals with your child that you write down together.
- Ask follow up questions. If you get home and have a question about something that was shared at the conference, please contact the teacher. He or she will be happy to clarify what was shared and answer your questions.

FCPS, Fairfax County Government to Hold FY 2011 Budget Community Dialogues

Fairfax County Public Schools and the Fairfax County government are teaming up again this year to solicit community input to help meet a significant projected budget deficit for FY 2011. Fairfax County is in the midst of a multiyear cyclical downturn requiring that county and school decision-makers continue to make expenditure and revenue adjustments. The school system's ongoing challenge is to develop a budget with an appropriate level of services that is both sustainable and acceptable to the community. As part of the budget process, FCPS and Fairfax County are hosting a series of budget community dialogues in September, October, and November. Citizens are invited to engage in facilitated small-group discussions to help find solutions to close the FY 2011 budget gap. Registration required.

Community dialogue meetings will be held:

- Wednesday, October 14, from 7 to 9 p.m., in the Marshall High School cafeteria and the South County Secondary School cafeteria.
- Saturday, October 24, from 10 a.m. to noon, at the Centreville Regional Library, the Reston Regional Library, and the John Marshall Library.
- Thursday, October 29, from 7 to 9 p.m., in the South Lakes High School cafeteria and the Woodson High School cafeteria.
- Saturday, November 14, from 10 a.m. to noon, at the Kings Park Library, the Sherwood Regional Library, and the George Mason Regional Library.

FCPS and Fairfax County officials will give budget presentations, followed by small-group discussions facilitated by staff members. Plastic Bag Collection Contest:

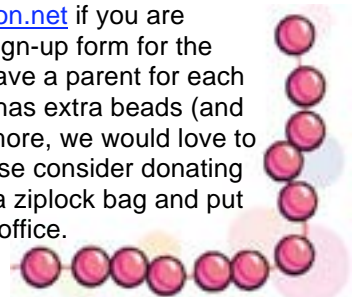

A New Kind of Bully

Kids today may encounter bullying anywhere and at just about any time — in the form of cyberbullying. Cyberbullying can include anything from mean text messages to sensitive information posted by others on the Internet, and it can hurt kids even in the safety of their own homes, as long as there's a computer or phone nearby.

Stopbullyingnow.hrsa.gov offers resources and tips for both parents and kids. Run by the Health Resources and Services Administration, a part of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, it has this to say about cyberbullying:

- Tell your kids to inform you immediately of any cyberbullying they encounter, and advise them not to respond to it.
- Try to identify the bully to address the problem head-on. Your Internet provider may be able to help track anonymous cyberbullies. Consider contacting the bully's parents and presenting proof of the bullying to ask for their help in stopping it.
- Block future texts or emails from known cyberbullies.
- Contact the police if the bullying involves threats of violence, extortion, harassment, child pornography or hate crimes.

Parent Tip Sheet: How to Talk So Kids Will Listen . . . and Talk . . . to You

Parents can do a number of things — especially when they're upset — that cause kids to tune them out. Heeding these do's and don'ts will help you get your child's attention and cooperation.

- DON'T lecture. Nothing makes a youngster's eyes glaze over faster than a long-winded, one-way monologue.
- DON'T moralize. When you say things like — "Don't you understand? If we expect people to be polite to us, we have to be polite to them. You wouldn't want anyone doing that to you, would you?" — kids feel you're talking down to them. Why should they listen to someone who thinks they're dumb and worthless?
- DON'T use clichés. Lines like, "This is for your own good" and "You'll thank me for this one day" draw attention away from the real issues. Kids want to hear the specific reasons you have for a decision.
- DON'T try to make your child feel guilty. It's good to let children know how their actions affect you. But they'll feel manipulated if you say things like, "How could you!" and play the martyr — "You're putting me in my grave!"
- DON'T speak in extremes — saying things like, "I'll never trust you again" or "You're always late."
- DO get your child's attention. Stop what you're doing and focus on him or her. Get close to your child. Touch your child on the shoulder. Look your child in the eye.
- DO reduce noisy distractions when you are talking to your child. Turn off the radio and the TV.
- DO show an interest in what your child thinks and feels. Give reasons for your decision or position. Check to see if your child understands. Ask your child to share her side of the issue. Acknowledge what your child says and try to empathize — even if you disagree.
- DO ask specific concrete questions. Not, "How was school today?" but "What do you like best in math?"

The Advanced Academic Programs Office (AAP--Formerly GT)

2009 Parent Information Nights

Fairfax County Public Schools offers a continuum of advanced academic services for all students in grades K-8.

Learning experiences are designed to develop higher-level thinking through enrichment, acceleration and extension of the Program of Studies. Teachers, administrators, and Advanced Academic Resource Teachers (AARTs) work together to provide the following Levels of Service:

Critical and Creative Thinking Strategies, Grades K-6 (Level I)

The AART and classroom teachers teach nine higher order thinking strategies across all subject areas and grade levels.

Differentiated Lessons in Areas of Academic Strength, Grades K-6 (Level II)

The AART collaborates with classroom teachers to provide additional challenges and resources within the general education program. The Young Scholars Model included in this level is designed to find and nurture advanced academic potential in students from historically underrepresented populations.

Part-Time Advanced Academic Program, Grades 3-6 (Level III)

Students identified by a local school screening committee for advanced academic services are challenged through models and strategies designed to extend and enrich the POS in core subject areas.

Full-Time Advanced Academic Placement, Grades 3-8 (Level IV)

Students found eligible for placement in a full-time Advanced Academic Program through a central selection process receive a highly challenging instructional program in the four core subject areas.

IBMYP: Selected Schools, Grades 6-10

The International Baccalaureate Middle Years

Program is designed for students ages 11-16. The program helps students develop the knowledge, understanding, attitudes, and skills necessary to participate actively and responsibly in a changing world.

Honors, Grades 7-8 Students who demonstrate high achievement in one or more areas of academic strength may participate in honors courses in any of the four core academic subject areas.

Screening Multiple criteria are reviewed to determine eligibility for all FCPS Advanced Academic Programs.



Formal identification begins with Level III services. The local school AAP committee determines student eligibility for school-based services. The countywide AAP Central Selection Committee determines eligibility for full-time AAP (Level IV) placement.

Testing Each fall all FCPS second grade students, as well as students in third through seventh grades who do not have ability test scores, are administered the Cognitive Abilities Test and/or the Naglieri Nonverbal Test. A second grade screening pool is established using these test results. Students in the second grade pool are automatically screened for full-time AAP (Level IV) placement. Parents/guardians may exercise their one-time retest option during the September-October testing cycle.

Referrals For Full-Time Advanced Academic Placement Level Iv (Grades 2-7)

Parents/guardians of students not in the second grade screening pool may initiate the full-time AAP (Level IV) screening process by completing and submitting an AAP Level IV Referral Form to the local school principal no later than February 5th, 2010. No late referrals accepted. Second graders not in the pool and all third through seventh graders are screened only by referral. Forms are available on the AAP website and in the Parent Information Packet available at the local school.

After a brief overview of Advanced Academic Programs grades K-12, there will be a break-out sessions for parents interested in learning more about each of the following: the screening process for full-time advanced academic programs, part-time advanced academic services, and middle and high school advanced academics opportunities.
