

HOW TO CITE YOUR WORK

When writing a research paper, you should always cite your source(s).

Use punctuation as seen in the examples below and use the following format:

- List sources alphabetically (do not number items)
- Indent the second line of an entry five spaces
- Double space all entires. (The examples below are *not* double spaced.)
- NOTE: When the form below asks for “Medium,” it is asking for whether the resource is Web or Print.

<p>FOR A BOOK PRINT Single Author</p>	<p>Author’s last name, first name. <i>Title</i>. Place of publication: Publisher, Publication date. Medium of publication.</p> <p>Example:</p> <p>Fogle, Bruce. <i>Training Your Dog</i>. New York: DK Publishing, 2010. Print.</p>
<p>FOR A BOOK PRINT More than one Author</p>	<p>If there are multiple authors: List the first-listed author’s last name first, then list additional authors as they appear (first name first).</p> <p>Example:</p> <p>Fogle, Bruce, and Jane K. Ripley. <i>Training Your Dog</i>. New York: DK Publishing, 2010. Print.</p>
<p>FOR A PRINT ENCYCLOPEDIA ARTICLE With author (Look for the author’s name before or after the article.)</p>	<p>Author’s last name, first name. “Article Title.” <i>Encyclopedia Title</i>. Publication date. Medium of publication.</p> <p>Example:</p> <p>Clark, William W. “Gothic Art.” <i>World Book Encyclopedia</i>. 2009. Print.</p>
<p>FOR A PRINT ENCYCLOPEDIA ARTICLE Without author</p>	<p>If no author, begin with article title: “Article Title.” <i>Encyclopedia Title</i>. Publication date. Medium of publication.</p> <p>Example:</p> <p>“Important Events.” <i>American Decades 1990-1999</i>. 2010. Print.</p>
<p>FOR ONLINE DATABASE or ENCYCLOPEDIA ARTICLE (NOTE: Most databases include their own citations.)</p>	<p>Author (if available). “Article title.” <i>Title of specific resource</i>. Title of database service. Publication date. Medium of publication. Access date.</p> <p>Examples (with and without an author):</p> <p>Lanes, M.E. “Fiber Optics.” <i>Grolier Multimedia Encyclopedia</i>. Grolier Online. 2000. Web. 12 Apr. 2006.</p> <p>“Alexander Hamilton.” <i>American History</i>. ABC-CLIO. 5 Jun. 2006. Web. 13 Jun. 2010.</p>

<p>FOR AN INTERNET ARTICLE</p>	<p>Author last name, first name (if listed). "Title of article." <i>Name of website</i>. Web publisher (if unlisted use N.p.). Date of article. Medium of publication. Access date.</p> <p>Example (without an author): "Food Lines." <i>The Depression Information</i>. U.S. Department of Health. Sept. 1999. Web. 3 Feb. 2009.</p> <p>If required, add the URL at the end of the citation with an access date.</p>
<p>FOR MAGAZINE OR NEWSPAPER ARTICLE PRINT OR ONLINE</p>	<p>Author's last name, first name. "Article Title." <i>Name of magazine or newspaper</i>. Publication date: Pages. Medium of publication. For internet article add access date at the end of the citation.</p> <p>Print Example: McGill, Kristy. "A Ballet Scramble." <i>Dance</i>. May 1997: 27-29. Print.</p> <p>Online Example: Cohn, D'Vera. "Hsing-Hsing Dies." <i>Washington Post</i>. 29 Nov. 2006: A7. Web. 12 Jan. 2007.</p>
<p>FOR AN eBook</p>	<p>Author's last name, first name. "Title of article." <i>Publication title</i>. Editors. Volume. Place of publication: Publisher, Publication date. Page numbers. <i>Name of Database</i>. Database owner. Medium of publication. Access date.</p> <p>Example: Nelson, Oliver. "Paul Revere." <i>American Revolutionary War</i>. Ed. Fred Barnes. Vol. 2. Santa Barbara: ABC-CLIO, 2006. 4-14. <i>History Reference Online</i>. ABC-CLIO. Web. 4 Mar. 2010.</p>
<p>FOR IMAGES PRINT OR ONLINE (Photos & Artwork)</p>	<p>Artist last name, first name. "Title of work." Date of work. <i>Name of website</i> (if online). Medium of publication. Access date (if online).</p> <p>Example (online): Brady, Matthew. "Abraham Lincoln." 1860. <i>Lincoln Archives</i>. Web. 22 May 2006.</p>
<p>FOR AN INTERVIEW</p>	<p>Name of person interviewed (Last name first). Kind of interview, i.e., personal, telephone, email. Interview date.</p> <p>Example: Underwood, Oliver. Personal interview. 29 Jan. 2009.</p>
<p>FOR A MAP ONLINE or PRINT (For print site as you would a book.)</p>	<p>"Map Title." Map. <i>Title of Website</i>. Publisher. Date of Publication. Medium of publication. Access date.</p> <p>Example (online): "Chantilly, Virginia." Map. <i>Google Maps</i>. Google. May 2008. Web. 15 May 2009.</p>
