Fairfax County Public Schools' Budget for 2010

Information related to the FCPS Superintendent's Budget Proposal can be found on the Fairfax County Public Schools' home page listed under School Board Actions for January 8, 2009, or at <http://www.fcps.edu/news/fy2010htm>. The FY 2010 proposed operating budget totals \$2.2 billion, a reduction of 0.5%, or a decrease of \$10.3 million from the FY 2009 budget. The total budget reduction and cost avoidances of \$157.5 million result in the elimination of 831.9 positions. The budget increases class size for general education and the minimum class size ratio for special education by 0.5 students, provides no salary or cost-of-living increases for employees, reduces many programs and services and does not include any new programs or program expansions.



Proposed Program/Attendance Area Adjustments

The most current boundary proposal for Laurel Hill, Gunston, Halley, Lorton Station and Silverbrook elementary schools can be found on the Fairfax County Public Schools' home page, also listed under School Board Actions for January 8, 2009.

I encourage all of you to keep up-to-date with these important issues as the budget impacts schools throughout the county at all levels and Halley as it relates to the creation of a new attendance area.

School Improvement Plan

The Halley School Improvement Plan for 2008-2009 has been submitted to Betsy Fenske, our Cluster V Assistant Superintendent. A copy of the plan is available in the school office for anyone interested to review.

CHILDREN’S DENTAL HEALTH MONTH

The two major oral health diseases are tooth decay (dental caries) and gum (periodontal) disease. Both diseases are influenced by nutrition and diet. Nutrition plays an important role in the development of teeth and oral tissue. Dental caries result from the interaction between the tooth, oral bacteria, and dietary carbohydrates (sugar and starch).

Plaque is a sticky film of bacteria that forms on our teeth and turns the sugars and starches in our food into acids. These acids act on the tooth enamel and cause tooth decay. If high-acid producing or sugar foods (raisins, cookies, cakes,) are consumed, they should be eaten with meals, not as snacks. Cheeses, popcorn, raw fruits and vegetables are low-acid producing food and make healthy snacks.

To prevent dental disease, remember to:

1. Brush teeth after every meal with fluoridated toothpaste
2. Floss teeth daily
3. Visit the dentist and dental hygienist regularly
4. Eat a nutritionally balanced diet
5. Avoid foods that stay in the mouth a long time and stick to teeth (raisins, hard candies, and caramels).

And Now, a Word From Your Librarian . . . by Kathy Brown, Librarian

Happy New Year! Now that winter vacation is over, it's time to buckle down and get through the winter, which is never my favorite time of year -- unless it snows!

Thank you to all for your continued support of our Book Fair. Whether you volunteered, purchased a book, or shared a book with your child, your support is vital to the success of the Fair and the library program. Funds from last year's book fairs were used to purchase three new computers for the library. I can tell you it is now much easier for students and teachers to access our on-line catalogue (OLC)! I'm looking forward to replacing the other two "OLC" computers this year.

Recently, your child brought home a flyer from the Virginia Department of Education (VDOE) titled, "Virginia's Focus on Literacy Achievement and the Lexile Framework for Reading." There are two Lexile scores: The first is *text* Lexile, which is assigned to a book. The second is the *reader* Lexile, which is assigned to a person. *Text* Lexiles are based on the frequency of words and the number of words in a sentence. Word counts are put into a scientific formula to determine the Lexile of a particular book. Lower Lexile scores indicate an easier book.

Teachers use a variety of reading assessments to determine students' Lexile reader levels. Once a person's Lexile has been determined, the text Lexile can be used to match readers with appropriate texts.

There is one thing that I would like for you to understand about Lexile scores. The Lexile is only one measure of the appropriateness of a book for a child. Other factors to consider,

which are not assessed by Lexile, include the child's interest, the child's emotional maturity, and the content and subject matter of the book.

For example, just because my Lexile shows that I *can* read a physics textbook, that doesn't mean that I *want* to read a physics textbook. My daughter is an excellent reader, but there are books that I would discourage her from reading because I don't believe that she is emotionally ready for them yet. On the other hand, some things I read are below my Lexile. Sometimes I just want to relax and have fun.



The flyer compares Lexile to a thermometer: "The Lexile Framework . . . is not an instructional program any more than a thermometer is a medical treatment. But just as a thermometer is useful in managing medical care, the Lexile Framework is useful in managing your child's reading development."

A thermometer measures fever, but just as no doctor would use fever alone to diagnose an illness, Lexile is only one measure of the appropriateness of a book. I would encourage you to know what your kids are reading. They need to be challenged, but not frustrated. They need books that are on "their level," according to the mechanics of reading (Lexile) AND the content of the book. And sometimes, we all need a little Captain Underpants, and to just have fun with a book.
