

7. Good vs. Evil (4-5 Players)

There are 2 narrators and 2-3 actors. One is good, one is evil. Good begins the story and takes it in a good direction. Then, evil will say freeze, and take it in an evil direction. They go back and forth until the end of the scene. The rest of the team acts out the scene.
Time - 4 minutes.

8. Day in the Life (4-5 Players)

Have a member of the audience recount an important day in their life. The team then acts out this day. Option- the audience member could narrate the acting scene.
Time - 3 minutes



9. Party Quirks (4-5 Players)

One member of the team (the host) leaves the room. Every other member of team is given a character type. When the host comes back, he is told he is having an _____ (e.g. trampoline) Party. The rest of the team then re-enters separately, and the host has to guess what character type each member of the team is.
Time - 4 minutes



10. Life in a Minute

(4-5 Players) - A lot like Death in a Minute with one major difference. Rather than something dying in the scene, something must come to life. Time-1 minute

11. Dating Game (4-5 Players)

This is played like a Blind Date show. One player leaves the stage, and the audience provides endowments for the 3 others. Examples might be No. 1 is stupid, No. 2 is neurotic and No. 3 thinks he's macho. The 4th player gets to ask 3 questions, and each of the others answer it. After the questions, player 4 should guess what the endowments were.
Time - 3 Minutes

12. Two Headed Expert

(3 Players) - One player interviews an expert on a subject given by the audience. The expert is played by 2 players. The first expert asks the questions. The second expert replies to the first player's questions word by word, one at a time. Time - Short

What is Theatre Sports?

Theatre sports is a form of improvisational theatre. It is the practice of acting and reacting, of making and creating, in the moment, and in response to the stimulus of ones immediate environment.

Theatre sports uses the format of a competition for dramatic effect. Opposing teams can perform scenes based on audience suggestions, with ratings by the audience or by a panel of judges (who are usually trained improvisers themselves).



THEATRE SPORTS

1. Synopsis (4 – 5 Players)

Each team is given a different synopsis from an actual TV Show. However, they are only allowed to read half of the synopsis and must begin the scene where the synopsis leaves off.

Time - 3 minutes



2. Dubbing (4 Players)

There are two players on stage, two players offstage. Each offstage person provides the voice for one person onstage. The people onstage do not speak, but continue to physically act out a scene.

Time - 3 minutes

3. Phobia (4 – 5 Players)

A normal scene, but a member of the team is afraid of one of the variables (For example - fear of bugs, large people, hands, etc.)

Time - 3 minutes

4. The Poet's Corner

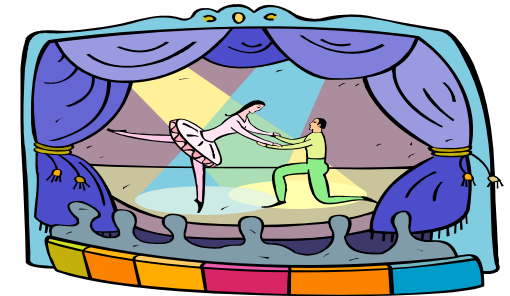
(2 Players) - There are two poets. One speaks English, the other gibberish. The gibberish speaking poet begins reciting a poem. At the end of each verse, the poet who speaks in English translates the gibberish poem into English.

Time- 3 minutes

5. Poetry (4-5 Players)

A normal scene, but the players must speak in rhyme.

Time- 3 minutes



6. Expert (4-5 Players)

One member of the team is an expert in an unusual field. Two topics are mixed to make it more absurd. (For example—an expert in the field of interior decorating using meat.)

Time- 3 minutes
