#### 5. Bookshare:

Is a free resource to children who have print disabilities, Books are available in a variety of formats. If you already have an account through school, consider asking your TVI for the log in. If you do not, you can create one for home. A form will need to be signed by the TVI or you can provide Proof of Disability. https://www.bookshare.org/cms/
