Administrators and mentor teachers/coaches may nominate first-year teachers who have demonstrated exceptional abilities and skills in their work with students, faculty, staff, parents, and the community during their initial year of teaching.

Lauren Armentrout, Grade 2, Graham Road Elementary

When Lauren first began teaching her days consisted of: Eat. Sleep. Teach. Now, after her first year in, they follow a different pattern: Eat. Sleep. Teach. Reflect. Recharge. Grow. Make a difference. Repeat. "Her enthusiasm for knowledge and dedication to the children is contagious and the kids feed off her energy," said one parent. Lauren continuously analyzes her teaching, and works hard to balance her work and personal life because, as she says, she is a better teacher when she is dedicated to both.



Jacob (Jake) Fannon, *Physical Education*, *Stratford Landing Elementary*

Jake is driven by the belief that students do not care how much he knows until they know how much he cares. His first goal at Stratford Landing was to make physical education a student favorite again. Jake turned the gym into a warm and welcoming environment where students can try whatever they want without having to worry about how others perceive them. Jake says, "When students see me doing the 'whip and nae-nae' they laugh and realize that they can relax and have fun too."



Evan McGrew, Grade 4, Fairhill Elementary

Evan attributes the success and progress of his first year to the supportive culture of Fairhill and FCPS. "I am proud of the work I do as a teacher," he said. "I love my job and I love coming to school each day." Evan hopes his students love school too, and that they have benefitted from being in his class. He knows they love to read and is always on the look-out for books to add to his class library. "Good books and stories bring us together," he says.



Caroline Shewmaker, English, Thoreau Middle

As a first-year teacher, Caroline constantly wonders if her efforts are having a true impact on the lives of my students. "After all," she says, "They are why I am in this profession." She says the greatest lesson she has learned this year is that there is no shame in asking for help. Caroline has really come to value the feedback from her coworkers, and sees her nomination as a form of that feedback. It lets her know that her colleagues see her dedication and that she must be making a difference.

Christie Antetomaso, Multiple Disabilities, Garfield Elementary

Christie recalls the one teacher that made a difference in her life, and says her goal has always been to be that teacher to her students. Although her first year has been tough, she says the endless support from her mentor, principal, and school staff, really helped her through. Christie began to focus on what was possible, what was actually happening in each moment and what she could learn from these moments. She said, "I learned that the greatest lesson in teaching is perseverance."

Jessica Berns, Multiple Disabilities, McLean High

Jessica says some of the most important things she has learned as a first year teacher are; use the content to teach functional skills; know when to ask for help; find a balance between work and personal life; do not lose who you are as an educator and, especially, learn to enjoy the victories, no matter how slowly they might come. "It is so fulfilling to inspire kids to learn and help them to be successful," she says. The successes, no matter how small, are what it's all about.

Christina Botten, Grade 5, Deer Park Elementary

Christina's first-year didn't go exactly as planned. Originally hired to teach kindergarten, she ended up teaching in the grade five advanced academic program. But, Christina rose to the challenge. "Being a first-year teacher is challenging, but if you add in the additional training and curriculum requirements for Advanced Academics it is exceptionally challenging," said Principal, Carol Larsen. "Ms. Botten has not only met the challenge, but exceeded expectations as a first-year teacher." Christina said, although it was exhausting, she underestimated how incredibly rewarding teaching would be.

Ashley Ferraro, Math, Edison High

Ashley includes fun activities and movement as much as possible in her lessons. She says she wouldn't enjoy being sedentary for 90 minutes, so why would her students. Ashley engages them through group challenges and discovery-based games that require students to practice the content she wants them to understand. Ashley continually seeks new ways to relate to her students and encourage them to do their best because she believes that every child deserves the best education.

Lauren Joseph, Grade 5, Hayfield Elementary

Tick, tock, time is up! "Time seemed to be my worst enemy," said Lauren. So, she turned it into an ally by setting realistic goals and organizing her tasks for each day. This shift made it possible for Lauren to transform learning into an experience that engages students and inspires them to want to learn more. "When a first-year teacher can teach and show evidence of student learning on the FIRST day of the job, I know she is an outstanding first-year teacher," said Principal, Jessica Lewis.

Rachel Kaplan, English, West Potomac High

Rachel's mother always told her she should be a teacher and, she was right, Rachel loves her job. "I feel grateful to have found my calling," she said. As a former reporter and speech writer, Rachel knows what potential employers will expect from her students, and says it's her responsibility to prepare them for the workplace. "I want my students to be people who know how to effectively articulate their ideas," said Rachel. "And that those ideas will more than likely to be the ones that change the world."

Demilyn Odango, Grade 4, Coates Elementary

Demilyn says the first day of school for a first-year teacher is not unlike the first day for students; filled with nervous smiles and anxiety. Eventually, a sense of excitement replaces the anxiety and the school-year progresses with new challenges such as time management, making personal connections, and behavior management. One thing she has learned this year is to be flexible. She says embracing change and the varying personalities in her classroom will allow her to grow and become the best teacher she can be.

Kathryn (Kate) Pflager, Grade 5, Beech Tree Elementary

Kate says she has changed tremendously in her first year, but one thing has not wavered, her rapport and dedication to her students. "I am proud of the positive relationships I have created with each of them." Kate utilizes her students' strengths to help build their confidence and shows she believes in them. Recently, one of her students got to name his new born sister, and he named her after Kate, and it's moments like these that remind her that the true value of teaching goes far beyond content.

Hannah Powers, English for Speakers of Other Languages, Glasgow Middle

Hannah says the biggest challenge in an ESOL newcomer classroom is not the language barrier; it is balancing the developmental levels of the students. She also says that teaching such a diverse class has been a joy. The students bring a rich knowledge to the classroom, which she has learned is a valuable resource to instruction. Hannah's first year has been a rewarding experience, and she feels fortunate to see progress in the social, academic and extracurricular lives of her students.

Sabera Rahyab, English for Speakers of Other Languages, Herndon Middle

Sabera says teaching is a blessing that she is thankful for every day. She appreciates the individuality and culture each student brings to class, and marvels at their young lives. "They have experienced life in ways that I have only read in books or seen in movies," she says. "Yet they come to school each day with smiles on their faces like they have not a care in the world." They are more than children that come to class to learn English, they are her inspiration.

Krista Schepis, Resource Teacher, Beech Tree Elementary

Krista says teaching is a frame of mind rather than a job, and to be truly effective you have to be a lifelong learner. She knew she would face challenges in the first year, and decided the best thing she could do was set clear goals at the start and keep them in focus every day. Krista's goals include developing relationships with colleagues and students; infusing each lesson with engaging activities, and starting every day fresh; modeling perseverance and a positive perspective to all of her students.

Harmony Tahy, History & Social Studies, Whitman Middle

Harmony is no stranger to demanding, fast-paced careers filled with daily challenges. As a former restaurant manager she developed skills that have benefited her greatly in the classroom. But, she says, nothing prepared her for what it actually meant to teach: that first conversation with a parent, the time commitment, or the joy you experience when you watch students produce work with pride. Harmony possesses a genuine love of teaching and an innate desire to positively impact the lives of her students both in and out of the classroom.

Katherine (Kate) Washechek, History & Social Studies, West Springfield High

When Kate started her first year she openly admitted she was naïve. After five months in the field, many of her expectations have changed, and her teaching philosophy has since been shaped by the realities of education. Kate says one of the most important lessons she's learned is humility. "I'm certainly not afraid to laugh at myself, in the classroom or in general." Although Kate loves history, she understands not all of her students may feel the same way. But, she hopes they will leave her class with an intense interest in their own story, and the opportunity to serve a greater purpose.

Corey Thornblad, Social Studies, Kilmer Middle

When Corey joined Kilmer as a social studies teacher she brought with her a wealth of experience gained on Capitol Hill. By bringing her in-depth understanding of the US Government and its history to the classroom, Corey serves as an example of classroom subject material applied in the real world and, by remaining active in politics today, exemplifies the importance of participating in the democratic process.

Corey's belief that students need to learn to think critically and write effectively inspired her to co-create (with Kilmer's head librarian) Bubble Up Classroom, an online community designed to address these concerns. One module included a thesis writing workshop that employed technology and hands-on learning activities. Through Corey's advocacy, Bubble Up was presented to the Virginia Council for the Social Studies Conference, the project was shared with social studies educators in Fairfax and across the country, and more than 1000 Kilmer students participated in the thesis workshop last year.

Katherine (Kate) Evans, Learning Disabilities, South County High

It's easy to see why Kate was voted South County's Teacher of the year. When she realized students who needed remediation weren't staying after school for help because of transportation concerns she decided to bring tutoring to them and established the Lorton Library Tutoring Program. "Every student has a passion and it is my job as an educator to help them find it, ignite it, and live every day attempting to fulfill the hunger that will help make the world a better place," says Kate.

Bettina Forman, Reading Teacher, Terraset Elementary

"[To] fall in love with reading you need choice and access ...," says Bettina. She doesn't just teach students to read, she teaches them to love reading. To inspire their appetite for reading, she lends them books from her library, finds ways to provide them with free books, and encourages them to use technology such as audiobooks to discover different genres. Bettina is known for her generosity and is highly respected among her colleagues and the FCPS literacy community.

Tara Frazier, Advanced Academics, Grade 6, Keene Mill Elementary

Tara stimulates student autonomy through self-directed learning and constant access to advanced content. A colleague said, whenever she reminisces about the student's smile that day, you can really see the pride on Patti's face.



Emily Godfrey, Librarian, Twain Middle

It is impossible to be around Emily and not be in a good mood. She exudes positive thinking and is an inspiration to others. Emily is dedicated to the support and success of staff and students at Twain. As a member of the 2014-15 FCPS Library Information Services Vanguard team she produced professional development materials for all librarians, and approaches all literacy activities and events through the lens of Twain students. "Emily is clearly in the top one percent of all educators with whom I have been honored to work," said one colleague.

Marian Hoelscher, Office Assistant, Sangster Elementary



International Country Club (ICC)

ICC has created an inclusive work environment for students in the Chantilly HS Career Preparation Class who have intellectual disabilities and autism. ICC provides a worksetting classroom in the hospitality industry and helps students learn job skills as well as life skills, consistent with the Commonwealth's Workplace Readiness Skills.

Serco

Serco has been a business partner with South Lakes High School for the past seven years, providing work experiences for students with disabilities. At Serco, on any given day, these students help restock office supplies, clean the kitchens, work in the mail room, and deliver mail to employees.

Trademasters

The Edison Academy's HVAC & Refrigeration program has partnered with Trademasters, a company owned by a former FCPS student, for over 15 years. Through guest lectures, mentorships, access to professional resources and training materials, as well as financial support, Trademasters has been dedicated to preparing the next generation of employees in the skilled trades fields.

Twin Tech, LLC Heating and Cooling

Thanks to Twin Tech, third-graders at Chesterbrook Elementary School participate in an extra-special yearly celebration of ancient cultures. Twin Tech volunteers transform part of the school into an Egyptian tomb, complete with a maze of tunnels, a tomb room and a mummy.

Volkswagen Group of America

Volkswagen provides funding to purchase food for Dranesville Elementary School's weekend backpack program for students who would otherwise not have food at their home. The company also provides volunteers to help pack the food bags that are sent home.

Finalists

Assistance League of Northern Virginia (League)

The League is a 100% volunteer organization that puts caring and commitment into action. During the 2015-16 school year, the League will provide over 6,000 weekend food bags to students at three FCPS elementary schools; over \$11,000 worth of clothing and personal items to children in extreme need at five FCPS elementary schools; and League volunteers will provide individual reading tutoring for 30 atrisk students in 1st grade. Over 500 volunteer hours have been given in the past five years, and close to \$50,000 in donated food. Nominators Christine Slattery and Janet Dougherty write: "In our work around Eric Jensen's book, Teaching with Poverty in Mind, we know...basic needs need to be met first before students can be available for learning in school...As a result of the [League's] support, schools are able to provide basic essentials...to families in need."

Fairfax Law Foundation (Law Foundation)

The Fairfax Law Foundation has facilitated trips for FCPS students to the Fairfax County Courthouse for over 30 years. With budget cuts in 2008, the Law Foundation began providing the funding for bus transportation and substitute teacher pay so that every middle school in FCPS has an opportunity to schedule two field trips. While at the Courthouse, lawyers serve as tour quides, and students listen to and speak with judges in the Circuit Court and Juvenile and Delinquency Court. Students have the opportunity to pose questions to both the attorneys and the judges, and see the holding cells where defendants are kept awaiting their hearing or trial. This first-hand experience leaves a lasting impression on students as they experience the reality of the local judicial system.

Greater Reston Arts Center (GRACE)

GRACE has been working with FCPS schools since 1976, and partners with FCPS through three programs. GRACE Art – an art education outreach program - supplements and supports students' school art experience through parent volunteers, trained under the auspices of GRACE staff. The GRACE Art programs reach over 20,000 students per year, with over 200 parent volunteers. Emerging Visions program offers FCPS high school students a chance to exhibit their art and learn from professional artists at the GRACE gallery. Most recently, a pilot STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art and math) program involved 350 FCPS students, helping them make the creative connection between art and science in workshops for teachers and students. GRACE also serves on the FCPS STEAM advisory council.

Kids R First

An all-volunteer organization, Kids R First partners with FCPS through the Collect for Kids effort and commits to provide school supplies for all students from low income families. Through relationships cultivated with local retail stores, Kids R First pays \$1 for \$3 worth of school supplies. In 2015, Kids R First provided customized school supplies to 25,000 students in over 60 FCPS schools. In early August, volunteers from local businesses load the supplies into multiple tractor trailers and transport them to Hughes Middle School in Reston, where they are sorted into individual school orders. Other non-profit partners provide donated backpacks directly to the schools. In 2015-2016, Kids R First purchased over 319,000 supplies, with a retail value of over \$500,000. Kids R First also offers mini-scholarships to assist high school students in need participate in programs and activities related to applying for college or securing employment through its College and Career Bound Program.

Washington Redskins Charitable Foundation (WRCF)

For almost three years, WRCF has engaged FCPS and several schools in collaborative discussions and innovative programs that benefit the educational, social, and fitness and nutrition needs of students. 100 students from Crestwood and Saratoga Elementary Schools were taken on a personal shopping experience to choose new winter coats. Students and staff chaperones at several schools have been invited to Redskins Park and FedEx Field to participate in educational and health related activities. Lee High School and several of Lee's feeder schools benefited from WRCF programs and resources designed to aid in the development of character, commitment and drive through their 4th and Life High School Football Program. Lee and five other high schools were provided "pink out" gear and spirit wear to promote Breast Cancer Awareness Month. Key Middle School received a grant for \$10,000 to design a program to effect fitness nutrition goals for students. WRCF launched an Education Advisory Council involving several FCPS principals so that WRCF programs continue to improve.

Apple Federal Credit Union (Apple FCU)

For over 60 years Apple FCU and the Apple FCU Education Foundation have been integrally involved with FCPS. Apple FCU programs include (among many others) the Great Beginnings program for new FCPS teachers; school supply, winter coat, food and toy drives for needy students and their families; a mentoring program; and a kindergarten reading program. (Award Winner: 2010)

Asian American LEAD (AA LEAD)

AA LEAD supports low-income and underserved Asian Pacific American youth with educational empowerment, identity development, and leadership opportunities through after school programs at Annandale High School, Poe Middle School and Holmes Middle School.

Arcadia Center for Sustainable Food and Agriculture (Arcadia)

Arcadia's Educational Programs engage more than 1,500 students from nine FCPS elementary schools annually. Arcadia helps students learn about the farm-to-table process via classroom visits and fieldtrips to its demonstration farm in southern Fairfax County.

Children's Science Center (Center)

Since 2010, students and their parents have been able to participate in fun, accessible STEM (science, technology, engineering & math) learning through hands-on activities at Family Science nights at elementary schools throughout FCPS. The Center's newly opened Lab is a destination for STEM-related field trips and more hands-on learning opportunity for students.

College Access Fairfax (CAF)

CAF offers assistance to FCPS students and their parents attempting to navigate the often daunting financial aid process for college. Financial aid clinics, parent seminars on paying for college, and specially trained counselors at area high schools are a few of the ways CAF supports college-bound students.

Dunn Loring/Merrifield Rotary Club (DLM Rotary)

Since 2010, the Dun Loring/Merrifield Rotary has provided scholarships to 20 students at the Fairfax County Adult High School. While struggling to finish high school against many odds, the scholarships have enabled these adult students to take college courses after their high school graduation when they might not otherwise have been able to afford them.

Ellanor C. Lawrence Park (ECLP)

The staff at ECLP has provided work-based learning classes and activities to students with disabilities from Chantilly High School for over 25 years. Students learn to enjoy and respect the environment while developing necessary work skills for future employment.

Fairfax County Council of PTAs (FCCPTA)

FCCPTA offers PTA programs, leadership opportunities, training and resources to 175 school PTA/PTSAs in Fairfax County. FCCPTA also offers recognition and awards programs for students in all FCPS schools.

Franconia United Methodist Church (Franconia UMC)

Franconia UMC members have provided reading, math and science tutoring, food support, and much more, to students in need at Franconia Elementary School. One volunteer writes: "...the joy and love this church feels for the staff and families of FES is remarkable and has a simple goal of nurturing future citizens..."

Girls on the Run NOVA (GOTR NOVA)

GOTR volunteer coaches guide and mentor 3rd – 8th grade girls through running games and conversations designed to teach healthy goal-setting. The 10 week season culminates in a 5K fun run, and the program results in a sense of community among the participants, and encourages the girls to share their strengths.

Good Shepherd Lutheran Church (GSLC)

GSLC provides 100 food bags each month for students at Dranesville Elementary school. The food bags go home with students-in-need as part of the school's weekend backpack food program.

Jill's House

Students with moderate to severe disabilities at several FCPS schools receive fun social engagement activities and learn independent life skills at Jill's House. Jill's house also offers overnight respite care so that parents are free to spend time with other family members.

McLean Project for the Arts (MPA)

MPA's ArtReach program provides engaging art-making activities to FCPS students in all grades through field trips and in-classroom sessions. Many of the participants may not otherwise have the opportunity to experience the enjoyment of learning and creating art.

Messiah United Methodist Church (MUMC)

Several volunteers from MUMC tutor students at Cardinal Forest Elementary school. Not only do the tutors assist students academically, but they build meaningful relationships during their year-long commitment.

The Old Firehouse

The Old Firehouse has provided many benefits to students and families in the McLean High School and Langley High School pyramids. Music, athletic, booster and other clubs have received free use of the space and other in-kind support for over 25 years.

Rotary Club of Reston (RCR)

The RCR members volunteer their time and money to multiple FCPS schools in the Reston area. Contributions include food for weekend backpack programs, professional development for teachers, dictionaries for third graders and mentoring of first graders as they learn to read.

Springfield Mason Lodge 217 (Masons)

The Masons, through the Masonic Angel Fund, provide assistance to children at Cardinal Forest Elementary School who do not fit the criteria for the usual social-service programs. Assistance might include a pair of glasses, a coat, field trip fees or a minor health expense – any need that will enhance a child's learning experience.

St. Joseph Ladies Society (Society)

The Society ensures that over 80 food bags go home in backpacks each month to students in need at Dranesville Elementary school. Thanks to the Society, these students are more productive at school because they do not have to worry about being hungry.

Tysons Regional Chamber of Commerce (TRCC)

The Youth & Education Committee of TRCC makes meaningful connections between TRCC member businesses and students at surrounding schools. Those connections include a job shadow program for highs school juniors and seniors, and the Chamber Stars Program for students in all grades who have overcome significant personal or academic adversity.

Outstanding Leader

The Outstanding Leader Award recognizes employees who have made a significant impact on students through leadership in their field. Winners demonstrate outstanding leadership in the workplace, strengthen and improve the learning environment through their work, and advance the FCPS student goals of: pursuing academic excellence, developing essential life skills, and demonstrating responsibility to the community and the world. Employees may be nominated for a specific project or initiative, or for sustained, noteworthy contributions to the academic mission of FCPS. Both instructional and support employees are eligible for this award.

Brian Lachance, School-Based Technology Specialist, Keene Mill Elementary




Sharon Williams, Poplar Tree Elementary
